The 'Let my People Go' programme

The Synodical Board of Social Services (SBSS) is the development and justice board of the Church of North India. The 'Let My People Go' programme was created to combat the systemic injustices affecting marginalised communities in India.

Let my People Go addresses issues of caste, gender and poverty faced by Dalits and Adivasis in 45 villages and 3 districts in 3 states in North India. The project targets



specific issues of deprivation in income inequality, education and health these communities face, whilst addressing those core issues of caste, gender and poverty.

It focuses on the following areas: facilitating education; accessing clean water and sanitation; mother and child healthcare; income generation and engaging the Church in community development.

The Anti-Human Trafficking programme

This programme is based in Kaliaganj, in the state of West Bengal. It operates in three districts: North Dinajpur, South Dinajpur and Malda.

The main objective of the programme is to spread awareness about human trafficking and show local people how they can protect themselves and others from getting trapped. The border region between India and Bangladesh is a well-known hotspot for illegal immigration. Many people cross the border without the necessary papers because they believe they will have more job opportunities or better-quality farming land on the other side. It is this promise of a better life that traffickers use to lure susceptible people.

The programme conducts awareness campaigns and rescue missions, and it has built a network with local government and law officials. It organises workshops and camps with teaching from human trafficking experts.

The programme also has a focus on promoting gender equality. It highlights child marriage, which can often lead to trafficking of girls and young women, and it collaborates with women's self-help groups.

Women's Helpline Service programme

The Delhi Brotherhood Society (DBS) with the Church of North India had been supporting women experiencing abuse for over 20 years. Since the helpline was created, there has been an increase in the number of cases of abuse and harassment being reported to and resolved by the local council, making legal aid and police protection more accessible.

The helpline plays a key role in the DBS's aims to reduce gender-based violence and provide emotional, medical, legal and financial support to women. Women are reassured that they can call anonymously and there will always be a sympathetic ear listening to them.

Running alongside the helpline are a range of activities on the ground. The Women's Helpline Service holds community meetings, awareness-raising events and celebrations, and provides help with rehabilitation and resettlement, property rights and legal advocacy. Outreach workers and community volunteers trained by the church visit women in person to discuss their cases in more detail. The women - and where necessary, their children and families - are given legal and financial assistance, and any other help they might need. The church regularly holds meetings and events to raise awareness of gender-based violence and gender injustice.
